OUR PATRONS

Jesus, Mary and Joseph are the three persons to whom this college has been dedicated.

God has no beginning or end. He is the Alpha and the Omega, the beginning of all things. As a human being, Jesus the son of God was born in space and time. He was a Jew from a small village called Nazareth in Palestine. He was born in a poor artisan family. At the age of 30 he began his work. He often mixed with sinners, dined with outcasts of the society and searched for those who had gone astray from the right. He was misunderstood by his contemporaries, accused with false charges before the Roman Court and put to death as a criminal on the cross. Yet he rose from the dead on the third day and lives for ever. Jesus is the same - Yesterday, Today and Forever.

Jesus son of God was born of a Virgin called Mary. She was very devout person. She always believed that God loved and cared for her. She trusted completely in the Divine. In fact, speaking about her, a saintly woman said, "Blessed are you Mary, for you have believed, all that was spoken to you by the Lord." Joseph the husband of Mary was a man particularly chosen by God to be the guardian of his son Jesus. He was a Carpenter by trade and a just man by upbringing. His sense of duty and justice coupled with faith and trust was the atmosphere in which Jesus grew up, as a young boy. In Christian tradition this family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph was called the Holy Family and upheld as model to be emulated by all families.

It was our earnest desire that everyone who enters this campus may receive the blessings of the Holy family. May the peace and joy that reigned in the family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph be always with you.

PROFILE OF THE FOUNDER

Fr. Mathias Wolf, the founder of the Soc. JMJ was born at Diekrick in Luxemburg on March 9, 1779 into a very large family. Mathias, as a boy, went to Latin Grammar School in Luxemburg. In 1792, this was closed down due to the threat of war, and of the French Revolution. Mathias then attended clandestine classes by an ex-professor with some fellow students. But the political instability forced him to flee across the Luxemburg frontiers. After some wanderings, he arrived at Cologne in Germany, and continued his studies at a Catholic University. On April 25, 1802 he was ordained as a priest. Though he had a strong desire to be a Jesuit, it was not possible because in 1773 Pope Clement XIV had suppressed the order of Jesuits.

For the next twelve years, Fr. Mathias devoted his life in priestly work in different parishes. In 1814, the Order of Jesuits was restored all over the world. Mathias asked the Vicar General of the Society in Rome, permission to become one of its members.

Fr. Mathias did his noviciate in Belgium, and on February 13, 1815 he entered the Society of Jesus. In June 1816, along with Fr. De Hasque, Fr. Wolff was sent to a little town in Netherland on the southern bank of Lek. There the people, in general were indifferent to religious practices. The two began giving regular instructions, preaching sermons to the people. The church was rebuilt. Fr. Wolff had a missionary zeal, and not withstanding his difficulty with the Dutch language, he brought many lost sheep back to the Lord. Fr. Wolff was aware of the difficulties in getting the children of the poor Catholic parents educated. He was also aware that education was the only means of liberating them from their miseries. Therefore, he made up his mind to do something for them.

It was then that three young women approached him with a desire to dedicate their lives in serving God's people. He sent them to Namur to the Sisters of Notre Dame for religious training. On their return, Fr. Wolff founded the "Pedagogie Chretienne" on July 29, 1822 in Culemberg, later known as the society of Jesus Mary Joseph.

THE SOCIETY OF JMJ

Thus the Society of Jesus Mary Joseph came to existence under the above title for the education of young girls. It started in India with the arrival of seven Dutch missionaries in Guntur, A.P., India on February 24, 1904. In 1962 the Indian province obtained autonomy. The formation of three autonomous provinces -Bangalore, Guntur and Hyderabad took place in July 1987. In 2009 a fourth province namely Raipur Province was erected in Chattisgarh. The Society has 1,238 members working in various countries of Netherlands, Indonesia, Africa, (Ghana) Rome, India and America (New Mexico). The Charism of the Society is **"Ever Adaptable Apostolic Availability".** According to the needs of the times and places, the Society takes up various apostolates and ministries. The members devote themselves to Medical, Educational, Pastoral and Social works. 110 years ago, the Society of JMJ that made a humble beginning with just seven Dutch sisters, has 100 communities all over the country, serving in 145 institutions of schools, colleges, technical training schools, hospitals, schools and colleges of nursing, health centres, social work centres for development of women and tribals, community colleges for school drop-outs, homes for the aged, handicapped, integrated school for the blind, lepers, HIV / AIDS counseling centres etc.

The JMJ Society in India is ever ready and open to the signs of the times to spread the kingdom of God which is a kingdom of peace, love and justice among our Indian people.

THE COLLEGE

1. VISION

To educate, enrich and empower the young girls to achieve academic excellence, spiritual growth and noble principles of life, to become integrated women force to lead home and society.

2. MISSION

J.M.J. Higher Education aims to promote the intellectual development of the rural youth who are socially and economically backward, and enable them to serve the society. The institution aims at enhancing the levels of competence, commitment and compassion to prepare the students as dynamic leaders and global citizens.

3. AIMS AND OBJECTIVES OF THE COLLEGE

The aim and objective of the college is primarily to serve the interests of the minority community, belonging to the Roman Catholic Mission. As such they are given first preference for admission to the College and Hostel. It aims at imparting a sound Christian Education, keeping in view, the Roman Catholic Religion and Faith, under the teaching of the Roman Catholic Church. It awakens and inspires in students, high ideals of service, social justice and the prominent role they play as makers of home and society. The College considers as its special obligation, preparation of the Christian youth to deeper experience of Jesus and love of fellow-men based on the Gospel. As such, the college as a minority institution reserves for itself, its inherent and constitutionally recognised right of management and administration. However the youth of other Christian denominations, creeds and classes are also given an access in promoting education, specially the socially and economically backward classes in the society.

We endeavour through our Motto, "Love in Service" in realising the following:

- To transform the girls into women of Character and wisdom
- To modulate their thoughts into a world of service and order
- To remodel the minds of innocence with sparks of intellect and elegance
- To make them master the tenets of science and technology
- To empower their tender hearts to become the leaders of the new worlds
- To inculcate the spiritual order, needed to lead the Society.

4. MILESTONES OF JMJ

Regular Classes began on July 2nd 1963 with 75 Arts and Science Pre-University students. In the following year (1964) B.A. Course was started with 12 students and in the year 1965 permission was given to commence B.Sc., with 24 students. From 1963-65 the college was temporarily located in the Municipal Girls High School, Tenali. The hostel with 30 students formed a part of the Sisters' quarters which was located in a rented building in the town.

In July 1965, the college was shifted to the permanent site. Classes were conducted partially in the temporary sheds and in the one wing of the main building. On May 17th 1966, the foundation stone was laid for the second wing by Sri A. Balaram Reddy, Minister of Education, Andhra Pradesh. In 1969 Vanitha Hostel building was completed providing accomodation for 150 students.

In 1971 the college was accorded permanent affiliation by the Andhra University. In the same year B.Com. course was introduced with 15 students. With the assistance of University Grants Commission and generously supplemented by the Management fund, the Administrative Block, Library building and Jyothi Hostel were constructed in 1972. The cherished dream of Sr. Stanislas to start the Department of Home Science was realised with the assistance of CEBEMO. Courses in Home Science was introduced in the Interemediate classes in 1973 and in 1975 eight students were enrolled in B.Sc. (H.Sc.).

In 1972 the temporary dining rooms were shifted to a spacious and well furnished dining hall. In 1973, Sr. Rosina took over as principal. A series of courses under Faculty Improvement Programme were conducted to improve Methodology of teaching and Evaluation techniques. In 1979 the faculty members had the privilege of having independent departments with spacious staffroom facilities. In 1981 the college had the privilege of availing an additional building for the Department of Commerce, for providing well equipped and spacious class rooms for each of the Science, Humanities and Commerce Departments. In September 1982 the General Inspection Committee headed by Prof. D.Bhaskara Reddy, the Vice Chancellor, Acharya Nagarjuna University adjudged the college as 'A' Grade college in the University. COHSSIP and COSIP were introduced in 1982. The physical facilities of the College and the Laboratory equipment are well provided through COHSSIP and COSIP. In the year 1985 an open stage was built. In July 1994 New Library building was inaugurated.

During the year 1997 - 98 new subjects Industrial Microbiology and Computer Science were introduced in B.Sc.; Mathematics and Statistics in B.A.; Office Assistantship and Commerce (Vocational Course) in Intermediate and B.C.A. was introduced in 1998. N.C.C. was initiated in the same year.

As a highlight of 175th Jubilee Celebration of Society of J.M.J. in the World, Septermber 6th is celebrated as the Non-Teaching Staff Day and those who completed 25 years of service are felicitated on that day. The Community College is a new horizon in the existing structure of J.M.J. College for Women, and it was inaugurated in July, 1999.

The motto of the Community College is, 'Including the Excluded & Giving Best to the Least' and the college is catering to the needs of the ever changing society, with its extended vision and mission.

It stands to credit that several of our lecturers have qualified themselves for M.Phil. and Ph.D. under FDP, offered by University Grants Commission, New Delhi. Seminars and workshops are arranged periodically in the College .This gives an orientation to attain the goals and objectives of the college.

The second floor of Commerce Block was constructed in the year 2001. In the course of academic year 2001 - 02 B.Com. Comp.; Maths, Statistics & Computers.;M.P.C. additional section in under graduate courses and M.C.A., M.Sc. (Comp.) & M.Sc. (Maths) were introduced under Post Graduate course. During the year 2002-03, B.Sc. Electronics were introduced and in 2003-04, B.Sc. Medical Lab Technology, M.Sc. Chemistry (Organic) & Anganwadi workers training unit was introduced . The Centenary Memorial auditorium was built in the campus in the year 2004.

In 2004 - 2005 Bio-Technology in Under Graduate Course was started. In 2009 PG block was inaugurated.

A central Govt. funded scheme Swadhar was inaugurated for the women in difficult circumstances in 2005. In the same year M.Sc Physics and M.A. Economics were introduced. M.A. English is introduced in the year 2009-2010, M.E.C Course in Intermediate and M.Com Course are introduced in the year 2012-2013.

GENERAL INFORMATION AND RULES

ADMISSION

- All the courses offered in this institution are notified by the UGC and Acharya Nagarjuna University. ANU is in the list of Universities maintained by the UGC.
- A prospectus (Hand Book) will be given with curricula including syllabi, details of faculty, evaluation procedure, duration of course, academic calendar etc.
- The student should produce all the original documents SSC Marks Sheet, Intermediate Certificate for Degree, Caste Certificate, Transfer certificate and Aadhar Card at the time of admission.

FEE AND FINANCIAL AID :

- The students are entitled to prior and full information about amount, components, frequency and mode of any payment including fees or charges of any kind. The fee particulars are given at the time of admission.
- Scholarship is available for the deserving candidates if applied in time with all the necessary information through online.

ATTENDANCE

1. Theory

i. 75% of Attendance is sufficient for being admitted to the Semester end and Intermediate Public Examinations, but the college insists on regular attendance for all classes. Therefore, no student should be absent even for one period either in the morning session or in the afternoon session, she will lose half-a-day attendance.

- A student should apply for leave only in the prescribed form. Leave may be granted only at the discretion of the Principal/Vice-Princial.
- iii. When a student takes leave for a day or two, she should submit her leave letter either before she takes leave or on the day of return from leave.
- iv. If leave is requested for reasons of illness for more than two days, a medical certificate must be attached to the application which shall be submitted as early as possible but not later than the day of return from leave.
- v. Leave letter submitted after the time limit will not be accepted.
- vi. If a student is absent continuously for more than 12 working days without leave, her name will be removed from the rolls.
- vii. Permission for representing the college in extracurricular activity like sports, games, Cultural festivals, NCC, NSS etc., should be obtained in advance from the Principal.
- viii. Once the list of students not having sufficient attendance is put up on the notice-board at the end of the semester, no request will be entertained.

2. Practicals

The minimum attendance for practicals is 80% of the total practicals conducted during the academic year.

CODE OF CONDUCT FOR STUDENTS

All students are answerable to the Principal, Staff and other college authorities for their conduct and behaviour.

Discipline is necessary to achieve success in life. Regularity and punctuality have a prominent place in the institution.

- ★ Courtesy requires that every student greets the staff when she meets them for the first time in the day.
- ★ She will endeavour to create an atmosphere of friendliness and good cheer in the college.
- ★ Neat and modest dressing in accordance with approved uniform, etiquette, decency gives weight to maidenly dignity.
- ★ Keeping classrooms and college premises neat and clean and treating the college property carefully, as their own, gives a sense of belongingness.
- ★ Decent behaviour requires abstaining from throwing paper, food, or other articles in the class room or around.
- ★ They will avoid standing on the verandahs of the college during and between the class hours.
- ★ Updating themselves by reading notices posted on the college bulletin is required and ignorance of any notice thus posted cannot be accepted as an excuse for failing to comply with it.

- The college has two Auditoriums, Board Rooms & Lecture Halls, three Seminar Halls, well-equipped laboratories, Inter Disciplinary Research Center (IDRC), English Lab & Commerce Lab, Mass Communication (Ede, Sat, Mana T.V), e-learning room, Indoor Stadium, Gymnasium, Prayer Room, Student Service Centers like Xerox Room, Fancy & Stationary Shop, Canteen, Information Center and Car Parking Area.

THE LIBRARY

Our College Library has an excellent collection of books over 45958 and periodicals over 136 and it is open to staff and students from 8-30 a.m. to 5-30 p.m. on all working days. Library is a storage of learning, promotes competitive skills, develops leadership qualities, and widens one's outlook in life. Reference section has variety of volumes which gives ample opportunities to get in touch with both antiquity and modern information in all fields of science and technology. This becomes an instrument to develop in students a taste for self-study and to increase self confidence. UGC Network center is located in the library.

General Rules

- 1. Strict silence is to be observed in the Library.
- Books will be issued from 9-00 to 9-45 a.m. 12.30 p.m. to 1.15 a.m. and 4-00 p.m. to 5-00 p.m.
- 3. Cards for borrowing of the books are issued to members of the staff at the beginning of the year. Borrower's cards are issued to students upon presenting college identification card. All borrower's cards shall be returned to the Library at the end of every academic year. In case of loss of borrower's card, a new card will be issued upon payment of five rupees.
- 4. A student failing to return a book within the prescribed period, shall pay a penalty of Rs.1/-. for each day until the book is returned.
- 5. Absence from the college will not relieve a borrower of their responsibility for returning books on the due date.
- 6. Library books should not be marked, written upon or damaged.
- 7. Application for books must be applied in person.

- 8. The borrower will be held responsible for any damage done to the books borrowed and in case of serious damage to the books, she will be asked to restitute the damaged books.
- Students should examine each book before borrowing and immediately report any damage to the Librarian, failing which they will be responsible for any damage detected after their use of the book.
- 10. Students are not allowed to take into the library any text book or printed matter along with them except note books.
- 11. Books on reference may be consulted in reading rooms only and under no circumstances they may be taken away from the Library.
- 12. Books may be borrowed for a week and renewed but not for more than two consecutive times.
- 13. The staff members are entitled to borrow 10 books at a time for a period of three months.

The Reading Room :

- Reading aloud and conversation in the room is strictly forbidden. The reading room provides ample scope for academic competence and career guidance.
- Any student marking or cutting of any magazine, news paper or books will be liable to fine and may be excluded from privileges of the reading room.

ACADEMIC GUIDELINES

As per the autonomous system, J.M.J. College has adopted the semester system. The academic year is divided into two semesters, each consisting of 90 instructional days. The odd semester is from June to October and the even semester is from November to March. Each semester is a complete unit by itself. The instructional methods include conventional lectures, classroom interactions, guest lectures, seminars, symposia, field study, etc. The syllabi and the model question papers will be provided by the respective departments.

Choice-Based Credit System (CBCS) :

In the academic year 2013-14, the college introduced the Choice-Based Credit System (CBCS) under which all Degree students are expected to earn a minimum of 124 credits for the completion of the Under Graduate Course.

BA/B.Com course students are expected to earn 134 credits (Languages - 18, Foundation Courses-20, Core Courses-96) and B.Sc course students are expected to earn 158 credits (Languages-18, Foundation Courses-20, Core Courses-120) from 2015-2016 batch onwards. In this system, all students choose any one combination of three major subjects offered. During the first three years, they learn languages (Part-I), the foundation courses (Part-II) and the three major subjects (Part-III). Students can earn extra credits by rendering community service during holidays/vacation through NGOs/Government Organizations/ Registered Trusts etc. 30 Hrs-01 Credit, 60 Hrs-02 Credits by producing authorized Certificate.

The first and second year students besides undergoing the regular curriculum, also choose three elective courses : one

knowledge based elective, one skill based elective and one general elective.

The third year students besides studying the regular subjects, also opt for two subject electives in Part-III (Papers VI & VIII) in each of the major subject. In order to make students, research oriented, all final year students are to undertake the project work (Part-III). These are the vital components of the Degree curriculum under the CBCS.

As per APSCHE guidelines of revised Choice Based Credit System the following **Life Skill Courses** and **Skill Development Courses** are introduced in the place of earlier 10 foundation courses with the same hours, credits and maximum marks with effect from the academic year 2020 – 2021.

Examination and Evaluation

1. THEORY :

The college follows a system of evaluation based on Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) and Semester-End Examination (SEE). The 100 marks allotted for each theory paper in a semester are distributed with 40:60 weightage between CIA and SEE.

a. Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA)

The CIA in Theory consists of tests, assignment and regular attendance during the semester. The 40 marks allotted for each subject in CIA in each semester are distributed as follows :

- Mid-Semester Test 25 marks.
- Assignments 05 marks
- Attendance 05 marks

• Seminars/Group Discussions/PPT/JAM/Paper presentations in seminars / Peer teaching / Role play - 05 marks

i. **Mid-Semester Tests** : Usually, two mid-semester tests are held approximately after 30 days of instructions. The dates are notified in the handbook. The syllabus and the model question paper for mid-semester tests will be provided by the respective Departments. Two mid examinations are compulsory to appear for the Semester End examination. 1st Mid Examination will be subjective (written) and 2nd Mid examination will be online (objective type).

Mid-Semester Tests are considered for final evaluation and award of class. Students should take these tests earnestly. Absence from a scheduled test will be viewed very seriously, if permission is not obtained from the Principal / Vice Principal before the end of the scheduled examinations.

ii. Assignments : In general, every student is expected to submit an assignment in each subject in each semester. The choice of the assignment, its nature and the time limit for submission will be decided by the staff concerned. No assignments

will be accepted after the stipulated date and it will entail loss of marks under this head.

iii. Attendance : Attendance will be calculated in terms of percentage while awarding marks.

NB : As each semester is a complete unit in itself, any deficiency in CIA cannot be made up in subsequent semesters. If a student is forced to repeat a semester for some reason, all her CIA marks will stand cancelled. While repeating the semester, the student has to follow the syllabus and the model question paper which are in force at that time.

b. Semester - End Examinations (SEE)

Regular Semester-End Examinations (SEE) for odd Semester (I, III, V) are held in Oct/Nov. and regular and supplementary for both odd and even Semesters (II, IV, VI) in March / April every academic year. Supplementary exams will be conducted in odd semesters also.

- i. Eligibility
- 1. Every student who has atleast 75% of attendance in a semester is eligible to take the Semester-End Examinations.

- 2. Any student who has between 60 and 75% of attendance in a semester may be permitted to take the Semester-End Examinations on payment of the prescribed condonation fee for attendance.
- 3. Student having less than 60% attendance in a semester will not be permitted to take the Semester-End Examination. She has to repeat that Semester, in the event of which, all her earlier CIA marks shall stand cancelled. However, if any student has between 50% and 60% of attendance in a semester and has atleast 85% of attendance in the preceeding or subsequent semester of the same academic year, she may be permitted to take those examinations, on payment of the prescribed condonation fee for attendance, without repeating that semester.
- In semester VI, if a student has between 50% and 60% attendance, she may be permitted to write the examinations, at the discretion of the Principal, under the following conditions :
 - In all previous semesters, her average attendance has been 75% or more
 - b. Her prolonged absence is due to illness or other exigencies of life and she has been regular to classes at other times.
 - c. If her case is recommended for consideration by a committee consisting of the Principal, Vice-Principal and the Head(s) of the Department(s) concerned.

ii. Registration

Every eligible student shall register herself for the Semester-End Examinations through an application by paying the prescribed examination fee within the stipulated time. The college reserves the right of permitting a student for Semester - End Examinations on grounds of discipline, attendance, etc.

iii. Examinations

- 1. Question papers for Semester End Examinations are prepared according to the latest syllabi and model question papers approved by the Boards of studies and the Academic Council.
- 2. Students who repeat a semester will have to take the Semester-End Examinations with the syllabus and the model question papers which are on force at that time.
- 3. All candidates have to answer the question papers in the medium as specified in their applications for admission into the course. No change of medium will be permitted thereafter.

2. PRACTICALS :

Unlike theory, the practical study in the respective subject streches the year, which is treated as a unit by itself. The practical methods include laboratory work, project work, field work, practical training, record work etc. The syllabi, model question papers and the practical schedule will be provided by the respective Department.

Examination and Evaluation : 50 marks are allotted for each practical examination in a year and distributed with 20:30 weightage for CIA and SEE

a. Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) : The CIA Practical assessment is based on the student's performance in laboratory work, project work, record work, etc. Regular assessment - 10, Record-10.

Record Work : Record work, complete in all aspects, is compulsory for assessment. The efficiency and the effort of the student are considered for the award of marks for the record work. A Student who fails to produce a completed record will be restrained from submitting herself for assessment.

b. Sem End Practical Examinations : All sem end practical examinations are held held at the end of each semester. All eligible candidates should take the examinations only during this period. No supplementary examinations are held at any time.

i. Eligibility : 1) A student should have atleast 80% of attendance in laboratory work in a year

2) A student should possess a duly certified record.

ii. Registration : All eligible students have to register themselves for all practical examinations along with theory examinations. No student is allowed to take the practical examinations without registration.

iii. Examinations : For the purpose of practical examinations, students will be divided into small batches. Each batch has to take the examination on a specified date and time as per the time table announced.



3. MALPRACTICE :

The college takes a serious view of unfair methods in all theory and practical examinations. Cases of malpractice noticed at any stage are severely punishable.

If students are caught for malpractice in the examinations, all the examinations of that specified period will be cancelled. In all cases of malpractice, the decision of Malpractices Committee is final and binding.

4. RESULTS :

i. * **Pass** : To pass any course, a candidate must secure a minimum of 35% marks in SEE as well as in the aggregate of both CIA and SEE.

ii. * **Computation of Class :** Computation of class will be carried out only at the end of Semester VI, when the candidate gets through all the six semesters.

A student is eligible for the award of a class only when she completes the part-II (Group) subjects within three academic years from the date of admission into the course.

Computation of class is done as follows :

Less than 35%	-	Failed
35 - 49%	-	Third
50- 59%	-	Second
60 - 74%	-	First
75% & Above	-	Distinction

Note : Any pass after the stipulated limit will be treated as third class, irrespective of the percentage of marks scored. It will be indicated by an (*) in the cumulative marks statement.

5. MEMORANDUM OF MARKS

Semester-wise marks memorandum will be issued to all registered candidates as and when they are ready. The authorities concerned are not obliged to give memoranda of marks after 90 days from the date of issue. Cumulative marks statements are issued to successful candidates at the end of the course on payment of the prescribed fee.

Students are expected to preserve all their memoranda of marks for future. It may be noted that no duplicate marks memoranda will be issued as a routine. In case of loss or damage, duplicate memoranda will be issued after completing the required legal formalities and paying the prescribed fee.

6. CANCELLATION AND BETTERMENT :

A successful candidate is not allowed to cancel her CIA and SEE marks in theory / practicals and reappear for betterment. However, a candidate who fails in the examination for want of internal marks may be permitted to take the betternment examinations only once after the completion of the course with syllabus which is in force at the time of examinations.

7. CERTIFICATES

- A student who leaves the college during the course of an academic year will have to pay the fees for the entire year.
- 2. T.C. will be issued only one day after receipt of the application for T.C.
- It shall be the responsibility of the person concerned to point out immediately to the principal and get corrected any clerical error in the certificate issued. Later the college will not be responsible for such mistakes.

Examination Reforms 2021-2022 (September) The following reforms are recommended for the approval of Academic Council:

1. As per the APSCHE guidelines for the revised Choice Based Credit System CBCS (W.E.F 2020-21), in the III Semester three Life Skill Courses (LSCs) and Six Skill Development Courses (SDC) were introduced. The students has to study two Life Skill Courses and One Skill Development Course in the III Semester. And so the students can choose one Life Skill Course out of three and Life skill titled **Environmental Education** is mandatory for all the students to study. A wider choice is given to the student while selecting the skill development courses. Every student has to choose **two skill Development courses** compusionally from each stream i.e. **Arts, Commerce and Science** during their three Semesters period.

2. **Core Courses :** Three Core Courses of domain subjects will be in the first three Semesters and the fourth and fifth Courses will be in the fourther Semester itself.

3. **Skill Enhancement Courses :** Two skill enhancement courses will be offered in the V Semester for each domain subject.

4. To make the students employable, an Apprenticeship / Internship / on the job training shall be undertaken by the students in the intervening vacation between the 2nd and 3rd years. Implementation of Apprenticeship/internship will be followed according to the guidelines of Andhra Pradesh State Council of Higher Education (APSCHE).

STUDENTS SUPPORT SERVICES

EXTRACTS FROM ANDHRA PRADESH ACT XXVI OF 1997

PROHIBITING RAGGING IN EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS

Prohibition of Ragging :

Ragging within or outside any educational institution is Prohibited.

Penalty for Ragging :

Whoever, with the intention of causing ragging or with the knowledge that he is likely by such act to cause ragging, commits or abets ragging and thereby -

- teases or embarrasses or humiliates a student shall be punished with imprisonment for a term which may extend to six months or with fine which may extend to one thousand rupees or with oth; or
- (ii) assaults or uses criminal force to or criminally intimidates a student shall be punished with imprisonment for a term which may extend to one year or with fine which may extend to two thousand rupees or with both; or
- (iii) wrongfully restrains or wrongfully confines or causes hurt to a student shall be punished with imprisonment for a term which may extend to two years or with fine which may extend to five thousand rupees or with both; or
- (iv) causes grievous hurt to or kidnaps or abducts or rapes or commits unnatural offence with a student shall be punished with imprisonment for a term which may extend to five years and with fine which may extend to ten thousand rupees; or
- (v) causes death or abets suicide shall be punished with imprisonment for life or with imprisonment for a term which may extend to ten years and with fine which may extend to fifty thousand rupees.

Detain of students :

(1) A student convicted of an offence under section 4 and punished with imprisonment for a term shall be dismissed from the education institution.

(2) A student convicted of an offence under Section 4 and punished with imprisonment for a term of more than six months shall not be admitted in any other educational instituion.

Suspension of Students:

- (1) without prejudice to the foregoing provisions, whenever any student complaints of ragging to the head or manager of an educational institution, such head or manager shall inquire into or cause an inquiry to be made into the same forthwith and if the complaint is prima facie found true, shall suspend the student or students complained against for such period as may be deemed necessary.
- (2) The decision of the head or management of the educational institution under sub-section (1) shall be final.

Abetment :

- (1) If the head or the manager of an educational institution fails or neglects to take action in me manner specified in subsection (1) of section 6, such person shall be deemed to have abetted the offence and shall be punished with the punishment provided for the offence.
- (2) If a student commits suicide due to or in consequence of ragging. The person who commits such ragging shall be deemed to have abetted such suicide.

Prohibition of Ragging in Educational Institutions Act 26 of 1997

SALIENT FEATURES

- Ragging within or outside any Educational institution is prohibited.
- Ragging means doing an act which causes or is likely to cause insult or annoyance or tear or apprehension or threat or intimidation or outrage of modesty or injury to the student.
- Punishment for Different Types of Ragging:

Nature of Ragging	Punishment
1. Teasing, Embarrassing and humiliating	Imprisonment upto 6 months or fine upto Rs. 1,000/- or both
2. Assaulting or using criminal force or criminal intimidation	Imprisonment up to 1 year Rs. 2,000/- or both
3. Wrongfully restarining or confining or causing hurt	Imprisonment up to 2 years or fine up to Rs. 5,000/- or both
4. Causing grievous hurt or abducting or rape or Committing unnatural offence	Imprisonment up to 5 years and fine up to Rs. 10,000/-
5. Causing death or abetting suicide	Imprisonment up to 10 years and fine up to Rs. 50,000/-

Note :-

- 1. A student convicted of any of the above offences, will be expelled from the College.
- 2. A student imprisoned for more than six months for any of the above offences will not be admitted in any other college.
- 3. A student against whom there is prima facie evidence or ragging in any form will be supsended from the College immediately.
- University level and college level anti-ragging committees / mentoring cells constituted for this purpose will look into complaints regarding Ragging, Eveteasing and sexual harassment.
